






#### Mental Health Heroes

The children were able to discuss what they used for shelter, what materials they used for making weapons, and how they kept warm during the winter months. The children also created some fantastic cave art!

### This week in Beluga's.....

This week, Beluga's have been working really hard in all lessons. All of the children thoroughly enjoyed a visit from Mr Smith from Amazing ICT. The children used Scratch to learn about the invasion of the Anglo-Saxons from Europe to Britian and the types of ships the Anglo-Saxons would have travelled in.

By the end of the lesson, the children had created a programme to direct the ship across the British Channel.











For Harvest Festival this year, we have been looking at Harvest Heroes. In Beluga's we looked at Meat Farmers and where our food comes from. All children, learnt about the Red Tractor Promise and created a persuasive poster to encourage everyone to look for the Red Tractor label on their food, because this meant that the farmer has to follow rules to stop animal cruelty.









After that, the children learnt about the role of the meat farmers and how they must be held responsible for their actions. We learnt that the farmers have to work through all of the seasons: the rain, sunshine and snow to ensure their animals are healthy and warm. We created this piece of artwork to represent the farmers working all year round.











Finally, to showcase all of the knowledge we have learnt this week on Harvest the children wrote an acrostic poem to represent the benefit of learning about where our food comes from.

## This week in Octopi...

Another great couple of weeks here in Octopus Class...

We have enjoyed celebrating Harvest Hero's this week!

We have been studying the role of fruit farmers and the important work that they do to enable us to have fruit to purchase and eat. We learnt about where our fruits come from, what the job role of a fruit farmer entails and we also looked at the difference between organic and fairtrade.

Additionally, we were fortunate enough to taste test a range of fruits including pineapple,










apples, pears, strawberries, blueberries, melon and bananas. We studied the packaging of each fruit to explore where the fruit had come from and then located the destinations on a world map. Furthermore, we had a go at sketching strawberries and oranges before using chalk and oil pastels to add colour and texture—they turned our great!









Each Base has nominated two children for this week's homework of the week award



### In the news this week

Wales has reduced its maximum speed limit in residential areas, close to homes and schools, from 30mph to 20mph, becoming the first nation in the UK to introduce these measures. Ministers in Wales have said the 20mph limit would make roads safer, with the aim also being to increase the number of people choosing to walk or cycle. Changing the speed limit, along with the need to raise awareness and amend road signs, has cost the government in Wales just over £32m. However, ministers believe the cost will be outweighed by reduced impact on emergency services and the NHS.
