Diwali


This week we have learnt about Diwali by discovering why different religions celebrate The Festival of Light. We then made our own clay diyas and Rangoli patterns.

Literacy

This week we have been learning all about Remembrance. The children have researched what happens on Remembrance Day, read various information texts about why it is so important, and understanding the significance of the Cenotaph. The children will be

using all this information to write a non-chronological report next week.



We did some 'Hot Seating' where the children asked each other various questions about Remembrance Day.

Maths:

Over the last week, the children have been working hard on their times tables. They have been using concrete resources to support their learning and worked in groups to solve various problems linked to the 3x and 6x tables. Art

In Art, the children wanted to make some Remembrance Day poppy wreaths after seeing King Charles holding one on Newsround. We looked into different ways to create them, and the children opted to for this approach.

This week in Beluaa's..

This week, Beluga's have been learning about the importance of remembrance and the impact of animals in WWI. To begin the week, the children have been reading the book 'Flo of the Somme'. In English, the children thought about using the 5 W's to create questions that they would like to ask Flo about her time on the battlefield. The children then took it in turns to ask and answer these questions.













After that, the children learnt about the different coloured poppies which we can buy to show respect for those who fought in the World Wars. The children created poppies using tissue paper to remember the different people who fought during the war.









Finally, the children created stained glass windows to remember the animals that helped during WWI. The children used silhouettes of the animals they had researched and have displayed inside their classroom.









This week in Octopi...

A fantastic first week back her in Octopus Class...

We have enjoyed learning about Remembrance Day and the inspirational person 'Walter Tull'. We have been learning about what remembrance day is, why it is important and why poppies are significant. Throughout the week we have researched the life of Walter Tull. We have written non-chronological reports about the life of Walter Tull, using the information that we had researched. We then had a go at writing a letter to Walter to ask him questions about the past and what it was like to fight in the war.

Additionally, we created models of the lung during our science lesson, to help us to understand how the lungs inflate as we inhale and they fill with oxygen, and then how they deflate as we exhale carbon dioxide.







Furthermore, we created some remembrance inspired artwork. We used chalk pastels to create an ombre effect background and then used black card to create a soldier silhouette. We are proud of the work that we created and are excited to display our work in class.

Finally, in maths this week, we have been exploring squared, cube and prime numbers. We enjoyed learning and recalling prime numbers to 19 and had a go at playing a 'snap' style game to support our understanding and comprehension.









This week in Sharks



In Art, we used the illustrations from the book as inspiration for our own depictions of the Flanders fields. Here are some of our examples:
















As part of PSHE we completed our flag of the month activity. Looking at the culture and traditions of Italy. We found out about customs, food and culture. Here are some of our information posters.

We have introduced a new award for Friday's award assembly.


This is in recognition of the fabulous homework most of our children produce. It is also to show the importance of doing homework.

Each Base has nominated two children for this week's homework of the week award



A new robot called Digit, designed to be human-like and that is capable of lifting and moving items, is being tested in warehouses of the online retailer, Amazon. The robot is in its first few weeks of trials at Amazon's facility in Seattle, USA, as the company tries to improve automation in its processes. To begin with, the robot is being taught to pick up and move empty boxes to ensure that they are ready for reuse. The yellow boxes, or totes, are used throughout the company's fulfilment process.
