#### **ATTENDANCE**

We are constantly striving to improve the attendance at Teagues Bridge. Can I just remind you of the importance of your child being in school and arriving on time. When children miss their learning it can be difficult for them to catch up. Obviously if your child is ill then they do need to be off and you must phone the school office on each day of their absence. Our overall attendance is 94% and we are aiming for 97%.

## Online Safety Newsletter February 2024

#### Setting up parental controls on your child's mobile

If you do not have the same mobile phone as your child, and therefore are unable to use Google Family link or Apple Family Sharing, then you can set restrictions on your child's device instead.

#### Apple devices:

To set up restrictions on your child's device directly (rather than using an app) then follow the instructions on the link below:

The instructions will show you how to get to the settings on your child's phone and then how to set restrictions such as restrict content, schedule downtime, set time limits for apps. You will need to set a passcode 'use a screentime passcode' to ensure changes cannot be made after you have set them.

#### Android devices:

As with the above link, this link shows you how to set up parental controls on the device itself by creating a PIN:



#### **PlayStation**

Does your child have a PlayStation? If so, have you set up appropriate parental controls? Some examples of the parental controls available are:

- Set age restrictions,
- Set daily limits,
- Control chat and messaging,
- Set spend limits.

Whilst age ratings do allow you to see if a game may be appropriate, it is also important to review the game yourself and see if it includes additional features such as chat. This will allow you to make an informed decision as to whether it is suitable and if you need to apply further parental controls.

#### YouTube Shorts

You should be over 13 to post videos on YouTube. YouTube Shorts are short videos which are similar in format to videos you find on TikTok or Instagram Reels. 'Shorts' are available to watch on the YouTube homepage or on the Shorts tab in the app. As they are quick to watch, they can be addictive and lead to excessive screen time. If your child is watching these videos, ensure they know that there is a report button. The INEQUE Safeguarding Group discuss this feature in more detail here:



### Snapchat: new controls

#### What is Snapchat?

Snapchat is a social media app used for messaging and sharing photos and videos. You must be 13+ to sign up. Users can send messages (snaps) to others that are only seen for a set time e.g., 10 seconds and users can also upload snaps to stories, which disappear after 24 hours.

#### Family Center: new features

Snapchat are expanding the features available to you in their Family Center, allowing parents to view:

- story settings: you will be able to see who your child is sharing their story with e.g. all their friends or a smaller group.
- contact settings: see who your child can be contacted by (by people they have added as a friend or their phone contacts).
- if your child is sharing their location with friends on the Snap Map.

## This week in Seals...

#### Computing

This week in ICT, we recapped how to safely research on the internet to find out about Brazil's population distribution. Once we had gathered our research, we turned our findings into data to collate it into a graph and then discussed why some areas are more densely populated than others.









#### Music

In music we have used the xylophones to practice playing and performing with musical instruments, whilst singing familiar and older songs. The children completed challenges from bronze and silver, through to gold to play different notes.





#### Jigsaw - PSHE


In our PSHE lessons, we discussed different challenges people can face and what we have faced ourselves. The children shared their ideas and discussed their different perspectives, learning about challenges beyond the ones they knew and how they can support a person to persevere and achieve.







## This week in Swordfish class...



This week the children have been learning to use a range of conjunctions in their writing to make it more interesting for the reader. They have also been learning how to use apostrophes correctly. As we are rewriting the story 'Mufaro's Beautiful Daughter's, I hope to see some of these features in their writing.

In 'Word Aware' we have learnt the following words: considerate, assembled, cunning and worthy

#### Maths:

In Maths, we have been learning to tell the time. We have looked at using analogue and digital clocks as well as looking at the 24 hour clock. The children have found this a real challenge. #### Science

In Science, the children have learnt all about soil. They are now aware of the different uses of soil and what it consists of. Ask your child the different types of soil and they may surprise you.

# This week in Beluga's....

This half term, Beluga's have been working extremely hard within their writing lessons. The children have been learning about fable stories and have focused on the story of Pinocchio. Throughout the week, the children have enjoyed understanding the story and asking questions about what they have read. Whilst doing hot seating, the children were able to think about what questions they would ask Pinocchio and how he might respond.











After that, the children wrote their own character descriptions on Pinocchio thinking about his personality as well as his appearance.









On Friday, we had a visit from Mr Smith from Amazing ICT. The children enjoyed learning how to use coding to create their own website. The children thought about key words that they would need for people to be able to find and use their website.







## This week in Octopi...

Another fantastic couple of weeks here in Octopus Class...

We have enjoyed another great workshop with Mr Smith from Amazing ICT. We incorporated our geography focus on 'Trade and Economics' by learning how to use Edexcel to record data through creating spread sheets to represent the cost per square, strip and bar of chocolate. We also enjoyed tasting the chocolate after we had calculated their average weights!










Furthermore, during science we have been exploring forces. We have conducted a variety of experiments looking at gravity, air resistance and upthrust. Our favourite experiment consisted of creating our own parachutes out of a variety of different materials. We used materials such as foil, card, paper and tissue and made predictions about which materials would provide the most air resistance and why. We then tested our parachutes by dropping each one from the same height and recorded the time each took to reach the floor. The parachute that took the longest to fall, we concluded was the most air resistant material. Finally, we drew conclusions based on our results and compared these to the hypothesis's that we originally made.















## This week in Sharks

The last two weeks in Sharks, we have been working hard in class. In science, we have started our topic about forces. We have looked at gravity and air resistance. During our lessons on air resistance, we tested which would be the best material for making parachutes - considering which material had the most air resistance. Here is some of our work.



We have also been working with Richard smith on HTML coding—the coding language used to design and make websites. We looked at how websites are made and also looked at writing some basic commands in HTML coding language.



### Homework of the week award

We have introduced a new award for Friday's award assembly.

This is in recognition of the fabulous homework most of our children produce. It is also to show the importance of doing homework.

We need to ensure that children are equipped to be able to complete homework, as a school we are looking at our homework offer and adapting it to meet the needs of the children.



Maria del Mar Galcerán Gadea is thought to be the first person with the genetic disorder to join a European regional or national parliament. She has been involved with politics since she was 18, when she joined Spain's conservative People's Party. Speaking to the media, Mar Galcerán said she wants to be seen as a person, and not for her disability.
