### Cricket Workshops

On Tuesday 24-th a coach from Cricket Shropshire came into school and led cricket workshops with classes across the school. The children learnt a range of skills and took part in lots of fun activities based on the game of cricket.





On Tuesday, all year 6 children, from Base 8 and 9 took part in Crucial Crew, based at Telford College. Crucial Crew is an activity based day focused around personal safety and staying safe in the community.

The children took part in 10 activities which included :

- dangers around water
- electricity
- fire
- roads
- health and wellbeing
- vaping
- strangers
- knife crime
- exploitation

### Textiles - DT


### This week in Swordfish.....

### English

This week, we have been exploring slogans and adverts. We have created our own slogans about saving nature. We then identified the features of an advert, for example persuasive language, eye-catching pictures and hooks before practicing creating an advert for a chocolate bar. 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### Cricket Workshop

We had an exciting opportunity to take part in a cricket workshop this week. A coach visited and delivered a fun and engaging session focused on developing our cricket skills. We practised key techniques such as batting, bowling, and fielding, and then applied these in a variety of mini-games and team activities. It was a great chance to build our coordination, teamwork, and understanding of the game — all while having lots of fun!

#### <u>Science</u>

In Science, we explored irreversible changes and what happens during these processes. We created flow diagrams to represent the changes, then investigated what occurs when warm milk is mixed with vinegar — a reaction that produces a substance called casein.




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### Star Player of the week award
