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Dear Parents and Carers.

Uniform



The children recreated his artwork in various ways and particularly enjoyed finishing the picture and practicing their line skills.

This week in literacy we have begun to immerse into our new text, 'City Mouse, Country Mouse'. After discussing the book and asking questions to find out more, we created a talk plan to roleplay the story and show our understanding.










This week in Swordfish class...



This week we have started reading our new story 'Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters.' The children have enjoyed learning more about the characters throughout the week and carrying out drama activities linked to some of the key parts in the story. As the story is set in Zimbabwe, we researched where Zimbabwe is and looked on Google earth to see how far away it is from us.

We did some 'Hot Seating', where the children were asked questions, but were answering from the point of view of key characters.

Maths:

We have been learning all about 'perimeter' since returning to school. Ask your child what 'perimeter' means. We looked at regular and irregular polygons and got out the rulers to measure accurately. Once the children became confident with this, they moved onto to reasoning and problem solving activities, which were a challenge! Please continue to work on times tables at home.

Art

During our first week back, the children did lots of art based on the painting Snow at Argenteuil 1885 by Claude Monet. Here are some of the pieces that the children created by themselves.

This week in Beluga's....

This week, Beluga's have settled back after their holidays and produced some fabulous work. During Take One Picture week, the children focused on a piece of artwork by Gordon Bruce. The children began by recreating the piece of artwork using paint. After that, the children were given half of the artwork and worked with their partner using watercolour to recreate the piece of artwork focusing on shadows within the picture.





In geography, the children have been learning about 'Trade and Economics'. For their memorable experience the children learnt about the importance of Fairtrade. Working in groups, the children used recyclable materials to recreate the Fairtrade logo.

This week in Octopi...

A fantastic first couple of weeks back here in Octopus Class...

We began the term by immersing ourselves in our 'Take One Picture' theme, whereby we enjoyed exploring the artist L.S. Lowry. We studied in detail his 'Going to Work' piece, before recreating our own match stick people and a scene with one point perspective inspired by his work. We explored using different techniques used by Lowry and enjoyed mixing

colours and experimenting with shades. Here are some examples

Additionally, we have enjoyed working with 'Loud Mouth' to learn about dangers such as county lines and grooming that young people across the country are at risk of being coerced into on a daily basis. The workshop was extremely informative and provided us with the opportunity to learn about dangers, whilst also being provided with the information about how to keep safe. During the workshop we looked in detail at the NSPCC

PANTS campaign and learnt about who we are able to speak to if we are feeling worried or unsafe, along with a range of services provided to support young people during worrying times.









This week in Sharks

The last two weeks in Sharks, we have been taking part in the whole school theme 'Take on Picture. We have been looking at the winter scene by Gordon Bruce. We first looked at the picture being in one point perspective and practised drawing buildings on a street using one point perspective. We then used half of the original picture and then sketched and painted the other half. Here are some of our examples:











In literacy, we used the image as inspiration for poems about winter. We thought about the vocabulary and the image the picture gave us. Here are some of our examples:

In the news this week

Motorists in Britain could be completing journeys using driverless cars by 2026 the transport secretary, Mark Harper, has predicted. He believes that fully autonomous vehicles, in which people become passengers in their own cars, will arrive in the UK that year and follow a gradual rollout. The government introduced a bill in a speech by King Charles III that paved the way for autonomous cars, without a safety driver, after pressure from industry, MPs, and Sir Patrick Vallance in his recent review of technology regulation.
