MOBILE PHONES

Children in primary school should not have a mobile phone in school. If there is a safety need for your child to bring a phone with them to school then you need to complete the mobile phone permission form, outlining the reasons for your child to be bringing their phone to school and hand this to the office for the attention of Mrs Abdulla.

Phones will then be locked in a secure box and handed to the child at the end of the day.

There have been some problems with children bringing their phones on the way to school if they are walking on their own. Just ensure you have set the parental controls on your child's phone.

Mental Health Support Teams working with

▲ schools to make a difference to pupils in need.

Trailblazing Mental Health Support Teams are working with 79 primary, secondary and specialist schools across Shropshire and Telford & Wrekin to promote the early detection and prevention of mental health problems among pupils.

There are currently four teams working alongside participating schools in the county – covering North Telford, South Telford, Northeast Shropshire, and Northwest Shropshire – with a South Shropshire team due to launch soon. They form part of the BeeU service, provided by Midlands Partnership University NHS Foundation Trust.



The teamwork with Mental Health Leads in schools to support them in developing the whole school approach to mental health and wellbeing. The teams also offer evidence-based support to children and young people experiencing low level mental health difficulties, such as low mood and anxiety, with specially trained Education Mental Health Practitioners working closely with each school.

This enables schools to be given timely advice, facilitating swifter access to specialist services, and building on support already in place from professionals, such as school counsellors, nurses, educational psychologists, and the voluntary sector.

Danielle Haslam, Lead for the Mental Health Support Teams said: "The teams are making a real difference in the schools they are working with; for example in Shrewsbury and Oswestry the team there is trialling drop-in sessions with targeted early help services to support parents and children. The feedback we've been seeing has been positive and I'm proud of the strong partnerships they have developed with schools.

"Mental health is a serious issue a ffecting children and young people, who can feel stressed, lonely, and frightened and often struggle to cope with the pressure they are feeling. By working directly with schools and supporting pupils at a much earlier stage, this will help to reduce the number of referrals into specialised mental health services and lead to shorter waiting times for young people accessing mental health services."




Design & Technology

This week we have been reading the story 'Escape from Pompeii'. Over the coming weeks, the children will be writing a newspaper report about the destruction of the city of Pompeii when Mount Vesuvius erupted in 79AD. Over the half term break, homework was set to research this topic and we have had some





fantastic responses! Thank you to all those who carried out research, made a volcano or drew their own front cover.

Fire Service

Swordfish were lucky enough to get a visit from the local Fire Service this week. The children were shown various equipment that's used to put out fires and also got to feel some of the protective clothing that they wear when entering burning buildings.





To celebrate Chinese New Year, we learnt all about what the celebration consists of and how it differs from how we celebrate New Year in the UK. The children were shocked to hear how long the celebrations go on for and all the wonderful things the Chinese people do to celebrate. We learnt about the importance of the colour 'red' and how the Chinese New Year brings friends and family together.



To begin this half term, Belugas have been working hard in all of their lessons. In English, the children are focusing on the narrative 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' while reading this book the children are going to learn how to write a persuasive text to persuade the children within the story to enter Narnia through the wardrobe. Belugas thoroughly enjoyed producing the story through role play.








In maths, the children have been learning how to problem solve. The children have focused on using logic to solve questions. By the end of the lesson, the children understood how to satisfy a criteria and use both positive and negative information to problem solve.









Finally, the children learnt about Chinese New Year. As a class, we learnt that 2024 is the year of the dragon and the children learnt that Chinese New Year is the beginning of the lunisolar calendar

This week in Octopi...

A fantastic first week back here in Octopus Class...

We have been busy in maths exploring working as a team to solve a series of finding all

possibility questions. We looked at how we could use series of coins to create a number of different combinations to solve

numerous questions. We then moved onto exploring how many times the number 5 appears in the 24 hour clock.

We had great fun exploring all possibilities!






Additionally, we have enjoyed exploring explanation texts during our English lessons. We have been focusing on our key text 'The Boreal Forest' and have used the non-fiction text to research the impacts climate change and global warming are having on the boreal forests and subsequently, the detrimental impacts that this will have on a global scale. We have explored explanation texts and played the roles of researchers, interviewing our partners on their research and knowledge.





The last two weeks in Sharks, we have been working hard in class. In maths, we have been learning about calculating with decimals. We started by multiplying decimals by 10, 100 and 1000 before moving onto multiplying and dividing decimals by integers. We have also been working on problem solving: Finding all possibilities. We worked collaboratively to find solutions to different problems on whole table cloths.



In Art, children worked on using oil pastels to create a sunset image. We looked at how colours can be blended using oil pastels. Here are our examples.



In literacy, we have been looking at the structure and grammatical features of newspaper reports. We have written a class newspaper report – look out for our independent writing on the next sharks newsletter.




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Star Player of the week award

In the news this week

In countries across Europe, including Romania, Belgium, France, Hungary, Poland and Greece, tractors have been blocking city streets and motorways as farmers protest against certain European Union (EU) rules. Their concerns include falling incomes, rising red tape, and competition from imports. Both national governments and the EU are now under pressure to stop the demonstrations. One protesting farmer, Hugo Auge from France, told news reporters for CNN that the current system, 'makes a mockery of both farmers and consumers'.
