Healthy snacks provide fuel for healthy minds and bodies.




This week in Turtles Class....





In Literacy we have been writing our own invitations to our picnic using tricky red words and making sure we are using capital letters, full stops and finger spaces




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
In Read Write Inc this week we have been learning our new sounds from set









This week in Starfish..




In maths, we have been learning our numbers to 50. We have been ordering numbers and looking at the place value of numbers. We have talked about how to partition a number into tens and ones.

This week in Literacy pupils have continued to learn about the information text Why do we eat? Pupils used their knowledge to write their chance to shine before moving on to our focus of writing a setting description based around The Great Fire of London and the book Vlad.

Pupils have learnt about the suffix endings er and est for comparative language.

Assessment Week

This week we have taken part in assessment week. The children have worked really hard to answer all their questions and use their previous knowledge to answer the questions. The children have been really positive about the experience and have done so well.

Maths:

In maths, we have been learning how to measure using rulers and metre sticks. We have learnt that when we measure with a ruler we need to start at Ocm and that a metre stick is the same as IOOcm. We have learnt that when we measure with a metre stick it is used to measure larger areas.













This week in Dolphin Class...








In literacy we have continued our work on 'The Owl who was afraid of the dark'. We created a talk plan and learnt to tell the story. We then used this to help us to write our own versions of the story. Our chance to shine writing was fabulous and we really enjoyed writing our stories.

In maths we have been learning about multiplication. We have been making and drawing arrays to help us solve multiplication calculations. We then used them to solve multiplication word problems and reasoning problems.


